

The covid-19 pandemic has provided authoritarian governments in numerous regions of the world an excuse to **restrict civil society activities**. In various Latin American countries, for example, the scope for NGOs is currently **shrinking dramatically**. Belarus or Kyrgyzstan and Hungary are also restricting civil liberties and taking **repressive action against critical voices** from civil society. Authoritarian regimes often deliberately seek to **divide** civil society.

According to CIVICUS, over 70 percent of all people worldwide currently live in so-called **"repressed or closed states"**, only 3.1 percent in open societies. A decline in political culture and the **erosion of democratic principles and values** have become a global phenomenon, manifested for example in the lack of acceptance for democratic rules or the lack of recognition of election results.

Guiding questions:

- Is it possible to counter the "authoritarian learning" of repressive governments?
- In which ways can civil society actors cooperate in repressive contexts?
- How can civil society organizations continue to cooperate successfully with their partners in the South?
- How can democratization processes be strengthened to enable sustainable development?
